	Birthday	2:43	The Beatles	1968, the opening track on the third side of the LP 'The Beatles' (more commonly known as The White Album).
	Backslap	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
	Party	1:30	Elvis Presley	From 1957 movie Loving You. Wanda Jackson recorded the song for her first album, Wanda Jackson, released in 1958. Paul McCartney also recorded the song on his 1999 album Run Devil Run.
	Meet Me At Mary's Place	2:43	Sam Cooke	1964, from album Ain't That Good News, which was the last to be issued during his lifetime, before his death at the age of 33. Written by Cooke about gospel groups in Charlotte, North Carolina.
	Two Can Have A Party	2:33	Tammi Terrell	Tammi Terrells' 1966 original recording. Overdubbed in 1967 with Marvin Gayes' voice to create a duet. Sadly, Tammi died in 1970 being only 24 years of age.
	Party Party	3:08	Elvis Costello & the Attractions	From soundtrack from 1983 comedy film of the same name which also features Bad Manners, Sting, Bananarama and Chas And Dave. Elvis describes this as being his worst song.
	Celebrate	5:10	Simple Minds	1980, from Empires and Dance, their third studio album and was recorded in Wales on the Rolling Stones mobile studio. Only got to 41 in albums chart, the opening track "I Travel" was released as a single in 1980, but failed to chart.
	It's My Party	3:50	Dave Stewart & Barbara Gaskin	Dave Stewart was in Egg, one of the so-called 'Canterbury' bands. Gaskin was formerly lead vocalist in British folk-prog band Spirogyra. A Lesley Gore song from 1963, this version was number 1 in 1981.
	Celebration Day	3:30	Led Zeppelin	1970, from Led Zeppelin III.
	A Celebration	2:58	U2	A non-album single from 1982, between the records October (1981) and War (1983) - only reached number 47.
	I Just Want To Celebrate	3:34	Rare Earth	From their 1971 album One World. The first act signed Motown that consisted only of white members that had hits.
	Release The Bats	2:58	The Birthday Party	An Australian post-punk band, active from 1978 to 1983, featuring vocalist Nick Cave. This from 1981 and was particularly influential on the emerging gothic scene.
	Ship of Fools	4:26	World Party	1986, written by Karl Wallinger, who is World Party, formerly of The Waterboys. Their only top 40 single.
	(You Gotta) Fight For Your Right (To Party) (Album Version)	3:27	The Beastie Boys	The fourth single released from their debut album Licensed to Ill (1986). Intended as an ironic parody of party themed songs, but was lost on most listeners who thought of it as a call to arms instead.
	24 Hour Party People	4:38	Happy Mondays	From the Mondays 1987 debut album 'Squirrel and G-Man Twenty Four Hour Party People Plastic Face Carnt Smile (White Out)'. Title used in 2002 film about Factory Records.
	You'll Always Find Me In The Kitchen At Parties	2:59	Jona Lewie	Released in 1980, reaching number 16. Lewie recorded the backing track entirely himself, apart from bass guitar from Norman Watt-Roy.
	The Party Line	4:16	Belle and Sebastian	From Girls in Peacetime Want to Dance, their ninth studio album, released January 2015.
	All Tomorrow's Parties	2:52	The Velvet Underground	Written by Lou Reed and released on the group's 1967 debut album, The Velvet Underground & Nico. About Andy Warhol and the people he surrounded himself with ("Warhol's Factory").
	Party Fears Two	4:10	The Divine Comedy	Originally by The Associates in 1982. This from the album "Victory for the Comic Muse" (2006). The whole album was recorded in 2 weeks and all songs recorded in live takes - even the orchestral sections

	We Want To Parrry, Parrry, Parrry, Part 1 & 2	4:25	Lyn Collins	Best known for working with James Brown in the 1970s, he produced this in 1975.

	Take Five	2:56	The Dave Brubeck Quartet	Composed by Paul Desmond (alto saxophone player) and performed by The Dave Brubeck Quartet on their 1959 album Time Out.
