	Backslop	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
	Welcome To The Jungle	4:33	Guns N' Roses	Featured on their debut album, Appetite for Destruction (1987) and was the album's second single
	Since You've Been Gone	3:18	Rainbow	Original by Russ Ballard, who wrote it in 1975. Covered by Rainbow for the 1979 Down To Earth
	Iron Man	5:55	Black Sabbath	Taken from their second studio album, Paranoid, released in 1970. Upon hearing the main guitar riff for the first time, vocalist Ozzy Osbourne remarked that it sounded "like a big iron bloke walking about"
	This Flight Tonight	3:24	Nazareth	Written by Joni Mitchell, from her 1971 album Blue. This from 1973.
	Jim Dandy	2:43	Black Oak Arkansas	Named after the band's hometown of Black Oak, Arkansas - lead vocalist is Jim "Dandy" Mangrum. 1973, from the High on the Hog album. First recorded by American R&B singer LaVern Baker in 1956.
	Speed King	5:05	Deep Purple	From their 1970 album Deep Purple in Rock - The song is one of the loudest from the album! The first song to be written by vocalist Ian Gillan who wrote a mix of lines from Elvis Presley, Little Richard and Chuck Berry songs.
	Fool For Your Loving	4:18	Whitesnake	From the band's 1980 album Ready an' Willing. Features Jon Lord on Keyboards
	Ballroom Blitz	4:03	Sweet	1973. Written by Nicky Chinn and Mike Chapman
	Crazy Horses	2:34	Osmonds	November 1972. A protest about the amount of pollution created by cars.
	Race With The Devil	2:52	Girlschool	From New Wave of British Heavy Metal scene in late 70s. They are the longest running all-female rock band, still active after more than 35 years
	Ace Of Spades	2:47	Motorhead	Title track to the 1980 album Ace of Spades.
	Silver Machine	4:40	Hawkwind	Recorded live at a Greasy Truckers benefit gig at The Roundhouse, London on 13 February 1972, but lead vocals later recorded by Lemmy in a studio as original live vocals by Robert Calvert considered to be too weak
	Can't Get Enough	4:17	Bad Company	Appeared on the band's 1974 self-titled debut album, it is their biggest hit and is considered their most popular song.
	Virginia Plain	2:58	Roxy Music	Their debut single in August 1972. Title "Virginia Plain" from one of Ferry's own paintings, featuring an image of cigarette packaging
	Sylvia	3:30	Focus	1973. Guitar/organ instrumental, written by band leader Thijs Van Leer, was the follow up single to Hocus Pocus.
	Born To Run	4:31	Bruce Springsteen	1975, title track from Born to Run, his third studio album.
	Black Dog	4:56	Led Zeppelin	Opening track on their fourth album, 1971. The song is claimed to be named after a black Labrador Retriever that was wandering by the studio during recording.
	747 (Strangers In The Night)	3:41	Saxon	From their 1980 album Wheels of Steel. It is one of the few Saxon songs that has been played on every tour since its release.
	Easy Livin	2:39	Uriah Heep	1972, it was the band's only hit in the United States
	Whole Lotta Rosie (Live)	4:05	AC/DC	This version from live album If You Want Blood You've Got It.
	Far Far Away	3:38	Slade	Released in 1974 to promote the upcoming film titled Slade in Flame
