	Here Come The Girls	3:06	Ernie K. Doe	Ernest Kador, Jr. (1936 – 2001), an African American R&B singer best known for his 1961 hit single "Mother-in-Law". Written by Allen Toussaint and released in 1970.
	Backslop	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
	Shirley	1:44	John Fred & The Playboys	This was group's first hit single, 1959. Best known for "Judy in Disguise (With Glasses)", 1967.
	Oh! Carol	2:18	Neil Sedaka	1959. Sedaka had dated Carole King when he was still at high school (Carol Klein at the time). Gerry Goffin - King's husband - took the tune, and wrote the response "Oh! Neil", which King recorded in same year.
	Lady Jane	3:09	The Rolling Stones	Included on their 1966 album Aftermath. It showcased Brian Jones's instrumental incorporation of baroque rock as it was beginning to be introduced, and became influential in originating the musical style later known as world music.
	Corrine Corrina	2:54	Big Joe Turner	First recorded by Bo Carter in 1928. Turner's version from 1941.
	Polk Salad Annie	3:46	Tony Joe White	1968, written by White. The type of food highlighted in the song is polk or poke sallet, a cooked greens dish made from pokeweed.
	Caroline, No	2:20	The Beach Boys	A heartbreaking song about a girl who is moving on with her life, leaving the singer to wonder why she changed and what went wrong. Last song on Pet Sounds, released this week in 1966.
	Quiche Lorraine	3:59	The B-52s	From Wild Planet, their studio album, released in 1980. Recorded in Compass Point Studios in the Bahamas
	Bette Davis Eyes	3:45	Kim Carnes	Written by Donna Weiss and Jackie DeShannon (who recorded it in 1974). Carnes' 1981 version spent nine weeks at No. 1 on the Billboard Hot 100. Reached number 10 in UK.
	Veronica	3:09	Elvis Costello	From his 1989 album Spike, co-written by Costello with Paul McCartney, and features him on his iconic Höfner bass. The song focuses on an older woman who has experienced severe memory loss.
	Felicity	2:35	Orange Juice	Founded in the Glasgow suburb of Bearsden as the Nu-Sonics in 1976 by Edwyn Collins. This reached number 63 in 1982.
	Jennifer Juniper	2:42	Donovan	Reached no 5 in 1968. Written about Jenny Boyd, sister of Pattie Boyd (who was first wife of both George Harrison and Eric Clapton). Jenny married Mick Fleetwood.
	Peggy Sue Got Married	1:51	Buddy Holly	Posthumously released in 1959, it refers to his song hit "Peggy Sue" and was one of the first sequels of the rock era.
	Deborah	3:09	Tyrannosaurus Rex	Their first single, 1968. Revisited on Prophets, Seers & Sages: The Angels of the Ages album and called Deboraarobed.
	Virginia Plain	2:58	Roxy Music	Their debut single in August 1972. Title "Virginia Plain" from one of Ferry's own paintings, featuring an image of cigarette packaging
	(Marie's The Name) His Latest Flame	2:08	Elvis Presley	1961, double A side with Little Sister. Written by Doc Pomus and Mort Shuman and originally recorded by Del Shannon.
	Ruby Baby	2:37	Dion	Written by Jerry Leiber and Mike Stoller and was originally recorded by The Drifters in 1956. Dion's version from 1962. Donald Fagen also recorded a version on his 1982 solo album, The Nightfly.
	Kathleen	2:41	Catfish And The Bottlemen	The band formed in Llandudno in 2007. Single from the album The Balcony, reached number 190 in 2014.
	Sally Cinnamon	2:52	Stone Roses	1987, their second single. Written by Ian Brown.
	Cath	3:49	The Bluebells	Scottish indie rock band, active between 1981 and 1986. This one of three UK Top 40 hit singles - all written by guitarist and founder member Bobby Bluebell (real name Robert Hodgens).
	Jennifer She Said	3:04	Lloyd Cole	Between 1984 and 1989, the band scored four Top 20 albums and five Top 40 singles in the UK. This is a later single, 1988, from album Mainstream.
	Christine	3:00	Siouxsie And The Banshees	About Christine Costner-Sizemore, whose struggles with multiple personality disorder were documented in the book The Three Faces Of Eve.
	Bernadette	3:02	Four Tops	1967, written, composed, and produced by Motown's main production team, Brian Holland-Lamont Dozier-Eddie Holland. Passionate lead vocals by Levi Stubbs.
	Jesamine	3:37	The Casuals	From from Lincoln and this was their best known hit, #2 in 1968. In 1965 they won the TV talent show Opportunity Knocks three times. Paul Weller has repeatedly referred to "Jesamine" as being one of his all-time favourite singles.
	Lady Eleanor	4:14	Lindisfarne	Written by Alan Hull, featured on the first Lindisfarne album, Nicely Out of Tune, 1971
	Oh Carolina	2:43	The Folks Brothers	Written by song by John Folkes recorded by the Folkes Brothers (John, Mico, and Junior Folkes) in 1960 and was produced by Prince Buster at RJR studios in Kingston. Shaggy released a version in 1993.
