	Blitzkrieg Bop	2:13	Ramones	Their debut single, released April 1976. Named after the German World War II tactic blitzkrieg, which means "lightning war"
	Backslop	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
	One Chord Wonders	2:36	The Adverts	One of the first punk bands to enjoy chart success in the UK, their lineup included Gaye Advert, whom was called the "first female punk star". 1977, debut single.
	7 Teen	3:24	The Regents	The group consisted of Bic Brack, Catherine Best, Damian Pew and Martin Sheller. Got to number 11 in 1979.
	Nervous Wreck	1:59	The Radio Stars	Their only top 40 single, 1977
	What Do I Get	2:55	Buzzcocks	Debut single, peaking at #37 on the UK Singles chart in 1977. B-side is "Oh Shit". Written by Pete Shelley
	Shot By Both Sides	4:01	Magazine	Written by Howard Devoto and Pete Shelley.
	The Day The World Turned Day-Glo	2:51	X-Ray Spex	From debut album 'Germfree Adolescents', 1978. In 1994, The Guinness Encyclopedia of Popular Music named it the 8th best punk album of all-time.
	(My Baby Does) Good Sculptures	2:53	The Rezillos	1978, from Can't Stand the Rezillos, their only studio album which was praised as "an action-packed document of their pop/camp approach".
	Whole Wide World	3:01	Wreckless Eric	1977 on Stiff Records. Produced by, and featured bass guitar (and most of the other instruments) by Nick Lowe.
	Dancing The Night Away	3:17	The Motors	Released as the lead single from their 1977 debut studio album 1. Produced by Robert John "Mutt" Lange, also produced AC/DC – Back in Black.
	Girl Of My Dreams	4:09	Bram Tchaikovsky	Was guitarist with The Motors from 77-79. From first solo album, Strange Man, Changed Man, 1979 and was a minor hit.
	(I Want To Be An) Anglepoise Lamp	3:02	The Soft Boys	Led by Robyn Hitchcock during the 1970s. Guitarist was Kimberley Rew, who left in 1980 to form Katrina and the Waves and wrote Walking on Sunshine.
	Irene	3:49	The Photos	Fronted by Wendy Wu, who had a top 5 album in the UK in 1980 on Epic Records, reached number 4 in the UK Albums Chart
	Part Time Punks	2:39	Television Personalities	The only constant member is singer–songwriter Dan Treacy. 1978, from their second EP Where's Bill Grundy Now?
	In A Rut	3:43	The Ruts	Debut single, 1978. Singer Malcolm Owen was found dead in the bathroom of his parents' house from a heroin overdose on 14 July 1980 at the age of 26.
	Kung Fu International	1:41	John Cooper Clarke	From 'Où est la maison de fromage', his debut album, originally released in 1978. The name means "where is the house of cheese?" in French.
	Pulled Up	4:37	Talking Heads	From debut album '77', written and composed by David Byrne.
	Im Not Your Stepping Stone	3:06	Sex Pistols	Written by Tommy Boyce and Bobby Hart and first recorded by Paul Revere & the Raiders in 1965. From The Great Rock 'n' Roll Swindle album 1979.
	Public Image	3:00	Public Image Ltd.	Formed by vocalist John Lydon (aka Johnny Rotten) and featuring bassist Jah Wobble. This reached no 9 in UK, 1978.
	Mystery Dance	1:37	Elvis Costello	Declan Patrick MacManus. 1977, from debut album My Aim Is True, cost £2000 to record and was the first of five consecutive Costello albums produced by Nick Lowe
	Jocko Homo	3:22	Devo	Title 1924 anti-evolution essay called Jocko-Homo Heavenbound by B. H. Shadduck, a satirical view of devolution. B-side of Devo's first single, "Mongoloid", 1977
	Lucky Number	2:48	Lene Lovich	Lovich was born Lili-Marlene Premilovich in Detroit, 1949, English mother and Serbian father. 1979 as B-side for her cover of "I Think We're Alone Now"
	Bingo Master	2:25	The Fall	Bingo-Master's Break-Out!, debut EP, 1978. Bassist and DJ Marc Riley joined shortly afterwards.
	Fragile	1:19	Wire	From debut and widely acclaimed studio album, Pink Flag, released in December 1977 through Harvest Records.
	Paranoid	2:05	The Dickies	Formed in San Fernando Valley, LA in 1977. This was their debut single, reaching number 45 in 1978. Banana Splits (Tra La La Song)" was UK No. 7 in 1979.
	There Must Be Thousands	3:26	The Quads	This 1979 single was a favourite of the BBC Radio 1 DJ John Peel, who selected it as his "single of the decade", but only reached No. 66 in the UK singles chart.
	Johnny Won't Get To Heaven	2:42	The Killjoys	Formed 1976 in Birmingham and included Kevin Rowland and also Ghislaine 'Gil' Weston, who would later join Girlschool. 1977.
	Complete Control	3:13	The Clash	Initially released as a single in the UK in 1977 and on the US release of their debut album. Features perhaps the earliest usage of the phrase "guitar hero" in rock music.
