(I Got) So Much Trouble In My Mind	3:13	Sir Joe Quarterman & Free Soul	Joe Quarterman, from Washington D.C, earned the title "Sir" in high school. From 1973, their biggest hit.
Backslop	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
Oh Well, Pt.1	3:30	Fleetwood Mac	Reached no. 2 in 1969, composed by vocalist and lead guitarist Peter Green. Has been viewed by some critics as one of the early crossovers between blues rock and heavy metal.
Magic Touch	2:51	The Bobby Fuller Four	June 1966. Within a month he was found dead in his car, covered in blood and also petrol and the resultant autopsy found his stomach was filled with petrol too.
King For A Day	3:37	XTC	From Swindon, led by songwriters Andy Partridge and Colin Moulding and active between 1976 and 2005. Reached no. 82 in 1989, from Oranges & Lemons, their eleventh studio album
Remembrance Day	4:05	B-Movie	From Mansfield, Nottinghamshire. This reached No. 61 in 1981 and was their biggest UK commercial success
Primitive Painters	6:00	Felt	1985. Led by the mononymous Lawrence. The band's name was inspired by Tom Verlaine's emphasis of the word "felt" in the Television song "Venus". Cited as an influence on Belle & Sebastian, The Charlatans as well as Manic Street Preachers.
I Found Love	4:21	Lone Justice	An American country rock band formed in 1982 by guitarist Ryan Hedgecock and singer Maria McKee, disbanded after 2 albums in 1986. From the album Shelter, 1986. Shortly after this release, McKee broke up the band went on to a solo career.
I Travel	4:05	Simple Minds	Johnny & The Self-Abusers, founded on the South Side of Glasgow in 1977. 1980, Empires and Dance
Moonage Daydream	4:41	David Bowie	First released as a single with the band Arnold Corns. A re-recorded version, featuring Bowie and his backing band The Spiders from Mars, was released in 1972 on the album The Rise and Fall of Ziggy Stardust and the Spiders from Mars.
Out of the Blue	4:48	Roxy Music	1974, from Country Life, their fourth album.
Date Stamp	3:52	ABC	From The Lexicon of Love, their debut album, 1982. Produced by Trevor Horn and features orchestrations by Anne Dudley. NME listed it number 15 on it's list of 50 best albums of the 80s.
Club Country	4:50	Associates	Formed in Dundee in 1976. Biggest success was in 1982 with the Top 10 album Sulk and UK Top 20 singles "Party Fears Two" and this.
I'm In Love With A German Filmstar	3:59	The Passions	1981, one hit wonders. Written by Barbara Gogan (singer) about Steve Connelly, a one-time roadie for The Clash and Sex Pistols and who had minor roles in several German films.
The Things We Do For Love	3:32	10cc	Reached no 6 in 1976, taken from the album Deceptive Bends. This was the first album since the departure of Kevin Godley and Lol Creme to form Godley & Creme.
The Revolution Will Not Be Televised	3:02	Gil Scott-Heron	1971. The song's title was originally a popular slogan among the 1960s Black Power movements in the US.
Beggarman	4:25	Smooove + Turrell	Jonathan Scott Watson (known as Smooove) and John Turrell from North East England. From Antique Soul, their debut album from 2011.
Take My Love With You	3:31	Eli 'Paperboy' Reed	Born Eli Husock in 1983, Boston, Massachusetts. From Roll with You, 2008.
Boogie On Reggae Woman	4:56	Stevie Wonder	From Fulfillingness' First Finale, 1974; one of the albums from his "classic period".
Everybody's Free To Wear Sunscreen	5:03	Baz Luhrmann	
Just Ask Me	2:14	Lenis Guess	A leading exponent of "The Norfolk Soul Sound"
Boogie Stop Shuffle	5:03	Charles Mingus	Twelve-bar blues from 1959 album Mingus Ah Um, rated 5 stars in The Penguin Guide to Jazz
