	Backslop	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
	Sweet Soul Music	2:20	Arthur Conley	Arthur Lee Conley (1946 – 2003), best known for this 1967 hit
	Wiggin Fool	1:41	Jack Hammer	1962
	The Duck	2:20	Jackie Lee	Born Earl Lee Nelson, one half of Rob and Earl which had a hit with "Harlem Shuffle" in 1963. Had further success as a solo artist under the alias of Jackie Lee, with this in 1965
	California Sun	2:24	The Rivieras	Originally performed by Joe Jones in 1961. The most successful version of the song was released by the Rivieras in 1964. Hailed as the last American rock and roll hit before the British Invasion.
	Surfin' Bird	2:23	The Trashmen	1963. A combination of two R&B hits by The Rivingtons: "Papa-Oom-Mow-Mow" and "The Bird's the Word".
	Just Ask Me	2:14	Lenis Guess	A leading exponent of "The Norfolk Soul Sound"
	Somedays	3:25	Major and the Monbacks	Founded by Neal and Cole Friedman in 2008 in Norfolk Virginia. Describe themselves as "merging retro 60's rock n roll, psychedelic twang, soaring three part harmonies with the energy and horn laden grit of southern soul"
	Nick	3:57	Songhoy Blues	They fled from their homes in north of Mali when radical Islamists overran the region, and on reaching the safety of Bamako, decided to form a band. From new album "Music in Exile"
	Give Me Back My Wig	3:36	Hound Dog Taylor and the House Rockers	From 1971 debut album of Theodore Roosevelt "Hound Dog" Taylor.
	The Midnight Special	2:06	Lead Belly	Song is traditional folk song thought to have originated among prisoners in the American South. In 1934 Huddie William "Lead Belly" Ledbetter recorded a version of the song at Louisiana State Penitentiary for John and Alan Lomax,
	Nobody's fault but mine	1:58	John Renbourn	Best known for his collaboration with guitarist Bert Jansch as well as his work with the folk group Pentangle. Died a couple of weeks ago. 1966, original by Blind Willie Johnson.
	Runnin' Down A Dream	4:24	Tom Petty	1989, written by Tom Petty, Jeff Lynne and Mike Campbell. From his first solo album Full Moon Fever.
	Rosalie	3:21	Bob Seger	From Back in '72, his sixth studio album, released in 1973. Made more famous by the Irish rock band Thin Lizzy, a single from the Live and Dangerous album in 1978
	Common People	4:41	William Shatner	From Has Been album (2004), produced and arranged by Ben Folds. Features guest appearance from Joe Jackson.
	I Walk the Line	2:19	Leonard Nimoy	From his fifth album, The New World of Leonard Nimoy, 1970. Originally recorded at Sun Studio by Johnny Cash in 1956. Nimoy passed away end of February.
	Der Hund Von Baskerville	2:52	Cindy And Bert	Known for their participation in the 1974 Eurovision Song Contest.
	Walking in the Sun	3:25	Percy Sledge	1974. He died of liver cancer at his home in Baton Rouge on April 14, 2015, age 74. First hit with "When a Man Loves a Woman" in 1966, at age of 26.
	Breakfast In Bed	2:58	Dusty Springfield	From her 1969 album Dusty in Memphis. Would have been 76 today.
	Joe 90	1:59	The Barry Gray Orchestra	Barry Gray was born John Livesey Eccles in 1908. Became popular with the Northern Soul scene in late 70s - but not amongst the purists
	Get On The Good Foot	3:39	James Brown	1972, his first gold record
	Think (About It)	3:23	Lyn Collins	One of the most frequently sampled James Brown productions, co-written by him and on his People Records in 1972
