	Asteroid (Pearl & Dean Theme)	2:17	Peter Moore	Moore (died in 2013 at age of 89) composed many songs recorded by such artists as Bing Crosby, Peggy Lee, Frankie Laine and Fred Astaire. This his most famous theme, Pearl & Dean currently supplies advertising for the cinema chain Empire.
	Backslop	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
	The Girl Can't Help It	2:32	Little Richard	1956 musical comedy starring Jayne Mansfield in the titular role. Words and music by songwriter Bobby Troup. Cameo performances of stars such as Little Richard, Eddie Cochran, Gene Vincent and Julie London.
	Wooly Bully	2:22	Sam The Sham & The Pharaohs	1965. Written by the band's leader, Domingo "Sam" Samudio. Featured in 1987 film Full Metal Jacket, directed and produced by Stanley Kubrick.
	Think	3:17	Aretha Franklin	From The Blues Brothers, 1980 American musical crime comedy film directed by John Landis. Aretha Franklin played Mrs. Murphy - the husband of Soul Food Cafe owner Matt "Guitar" Murphy.
	Just Dropped In (To See What Condition My Condition Is In)	3:20	Kenny Rogers & The First Edition	The Big Lebowski, 1998. Written, produced, and directed by Joel and Ethan Coen. Written by Mickey Newbury, this was a hit in 1968.
	Ride Of The Valkyries	4:30	Artur Rodzinski & Royal Philharmonic Orchestra	From Richard Wagner 1851 opera Der Ring des Nibelungen. Most associated with Apocalypse Now (1979) where the 1/9 Air Cavalry regiment plays it on helicopter-mounted loudspeakers during their assault on a Vietnamese village.
	Get Carter	3:00	Roy Budd	1971, the film's budget reputedly allowed only £450 for the score, but he overcame this restriction by using only three musicians, including himself playing electric piano and harpsichord simultaneously.
	Driver's Seat	4:00	Sniff 'N' The Tears	Their one-hit wonder from 1979. According to singer Paul Roberts, it isn't about driving, but rather "fragmented, conflicting thoughts and emotions that might follow the break-up of a relationship". Featured in 1997 film Boogie Nights.
	Old Time Rock & Roll	3:17	Bob Seger & The Silver Bullet Band	Written by George Jackson and recorded by Seger on his 1978 album Stranger in Town. It gained a huge amount of popularity after being featured in the 1983 film Risky Business. Michael Bolton currently has a cover version of it.
	What a Dog/He's a Tramp	2:25	Peggy Lee	Lady and the Tramp, 1955, represented two firsts for Disney: It was the studio's first Cinemascope animated feature, and it was their first full-length cartoon based on an original story rather than an established classic.
	Ev'rybody Wants to Be a Cat - The Aristocats	2:01	Scatman Crothers, Phil Harris and Thurl Ravenscroft	From The Aristocats, 1970, with Phil Harris as Thomas O'Malley. He also voiced Baloo the Bear in the Jungle Book 3 years earlier.
	Wicked Game	4:47	Chris Isaak	From his third studio album Heart Shaped World (1989). It didn't become a hit until it was later featured in the David Lynch film Wild at Heart (1990).
	I Am A Man Of Constant Sorrow	3:10	The Soggy Bottom Boys	Traditional American folk song first published by Dick Burnett, a partially blind fiddler from Kentucky in 1913. Interest was renewed after the release of the 2000 film O Brother, Where Art Thou? Lead vocal by Dan Tyminski.
	Gonna Fly Now	2:49	DeEtta Little & Nelson Pigford	Theme from Rocky, 1977. It became part of American popular culture after Rocky Balboa runs up the 72 stone steps leading to the entrance of the Philadelphia Museum of Art and raises his arms in a victory pose with this playing.
	Main title from 'The man with the golden arm'	2:51	Billy May Orchestra	The Man with the Golden Arm, 1955, tells the story of a drug addict who gets clean while in prison, but struggles to stay that way in the outside world. It stars Frank Sinatra and Kim Novak.
	Transmission	3:37	Joy Division	24 Hour Party People, 2002. British comedy-drama film about Manchester's popular music community from 1976 to 1992, and specifically about Factory Records. This was their debut single from 1979.
	Miracle Man	3:33	Elvis Costello	From The Godfather Part III, 1990, written by Mario Puzo and Francis Ford Coppola, and directed by Coppola. From his 1977 debut album, My Aim Is True.
	Snowhill	3:08	Agent Blue	Featured on Burnout Paradise is an open world racing video game, released 2008. The theme song of the game is "Paradise City" by Guns N' Roses. This was released in 2003, the band are from Stoke and features Calum Murphy on bass.
	Tonight The Streets Are Ours	3:40	Richard Hawley	Featured in 2010 film Exit Through the gift shop by street artist Banksy that tells the story of Thierry Guetta, a French immigrant in Los Angeles, and his obsession with street art.
	Bang, bang	2:41	Nancy Sinatra	At beginning of Kill Bill Volume 1, released in late 2003. The Bride lies on the floor, bloody of face and staring up at an assailant. A shot rings out and Nancy Sinatra's lament slowly begins to unfurl with a subtle tension.
	Paper Planes	3:24	M.I.A.	By British rapper M.I.A. from her second studio album, Kala (2007), it's backing track is a replayed sample of the 1982 song "Straight to Hell" by The Clash. Featured in Slumdog Millionaire, 2008 British drama film directed by Danny Boyle
	Lust for Life (The Prodigy Remix)	5:00	Iggy Pop	From 2107's T2 Trainspotting, also directed by Danny Boyle. This a Prodigy Remix of the song that appeared in the original Trainspotting film in 1996.
	You Never Can Tell	2:43	Chuck Berry	In Pulp Fiction (1994) this was played for a "Twist contest" in which Vincent Vega (John Travolta) and Mia Wallace (Uma Thurman) competed and won (and were the only contestants shown in the film).
	Across 110th Street	3:46	Bobby Womack	1972 American crime drama film starring Anthony Quinn. Later featured in Quentin Tarantino's 1997 blaxploitation homage Jackie Brown.
	We Have All The Time In The World	3:13	Louis Armstrong	Composed by John Barry and the lyrics by Hal David. It is a secondary musical theme in the 1969 Bond film On Her Majesty's Secret Service. The song title is taken from Bond's final words in both the novel and the film.
	In Dreams	2:50	Roy Orbison	Blue Velvet, 1986, written and directed by David Lynch. Sstars Kyle MacLachlan, Isabella Rossellini, Dennis Hopper and Laura Dern.
	The Magnificent Seven	1:50	Elmer Bernstein	From the 1960 film The Magnificent Seven, starring Charles Bronson, Yul Brynner, James Coburn and Steve McQueen. The theme was also included in the 1979 James Bond film Moonraker.
