	Chitty Chitty Bang Bang	1:47	Dick Van Dyke	1968 British musical film loosely based on Ian Fleming's novel Chitty-Chitty-Bang-Bang: The Magical Car. Songs by the Sherman Brothers.
	Backslop	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
	Asteroid (From "Pearl & Dean")	0:16	Pearl & Dean	
	Puffin' Billy	2:58	Melodi Light Orchestra	Signature tune for the BBC Light Programme's 'Children's Favourites', a radio request programme, from 1952 to 1966.
	My Boomerang Won't Come Back	3:40	Charlie Drake	A surprise hit on both sides of the Atlantic in 1961. Produced by George Martin, who went on to even more enduring fame with some group called The Beatles
	Champion the Wonder Horse	2:17	Frankie Laine	An American children's Western series that ran for 26 episodes in 1955/56. In real life, the Wonder Horse, Champion, was owned by Gene Autry
	The Hole In The Ground	1:50	Bernard Cribbins	1962, it was a number 9 hit in the UK Singles Chart and remains his highest charting and the most successful of his three hit singles.
	Right Said Fred	2:17	Bernard Cribbins	1962, recorded at Abbey Road Studios, and sound effects were added by George Martin
	Beep Beep	2:33	The Playmates	1958, a competition between the drivers of a Cadillac and a Nash Rambler. An example of accelerando, in which the tempo of the song gradually increases throughout the song.
	Little White Bull	3:45	Tommy Steele	1959, from film "Tommy The Toreador". Dubbed Britain's answer to Elvis Presley, had no 1 with "Singing the Blues" in 1957, and The Tommy Steele Story was the first album by a UK act to reach no 1.
	Three Wheels On My Wagon	3:03	The New Christy Minstrels	1961, lyrics by Bob Hilliard and music by Burt Bacharach. Barry McGuire (Eve of Destruction) on vocals. Regularly requested on Junior Choice.
	Sparky's Magic Piano	6:20	Henry Blair	Released 1948, became the best-known of all the Sparky stories. Sparky is a little boy with an overactive imagination. His adventures involve objects which magically come to life and talk to him.
	Walk Tall	2:34	Val Doonican	1964, his first single, and it made top 10. Born 1928, the youngest of the 8 children.
	The Dambusters March	3:04	Central Band Of The RAF	617 formed at RAF Scampton 1943, carried out Operation Chastise against four Dams in the Ruhr using Barnes Wallis' "bouncing bomb".
	Remember You're A Womble	3:10	The Wombles	1974, from second album released by The Wombles. The songs were recorded by Mike Batt (vocals/keyboards) and included Chris Spedding on guitar.
	Hev Yew Gotta Loight, Boy?	2:18	Allan Smethurst aka The Singing Postman	1966 His big hit, a love song which sees him romancing local girl Molly Windley; they marry, she presents him with triplets, and they live happily ever after.
	Theme from Animal Magic	0:39	Laurie Johnson	Johnson composed over fifty themes and scores, including: This Is Your Life, The Avengers, Jason King, The New Avengers and The Professionals.
	White Horses	2:21	Jacky	1965, German TV production. The story follows the adventures of a teenage girl Julia who leaves Belgrade to spend a holiday on a stud farm run by her Uncle Dimitr.
	The Lightning Tree - Follyfoot TV Theme (1973)	2:42	The Settlers	1971-73, set at a home of rest for horses - often had challenging things to say about the treatment of horses and animals generally in British society.
	Three Little Fishes	3:22	Frankie Howard	Originally a hit in the US in 1939, Frankie Howerd covered it. In 1949. About three little fishes who stray too far from home and meet a horrible fate!
	The Ugly Bug Ball - Summer Magic	3:02	Burl Ives	1963, written by the Sherman Brothers for the movie Summer Magic, starring Hayley Mills.
	The Bare Necessities	4:49	Phil Harris (Baloo) and Bruce Reitherman (Mowgli)	From the 1967 Disney film The Jungle Book. Written by Terry Gilkyson, The Sherman Brothers wrote the other songs in the film.
	Ernie (The Fastest Milkman In The West)	3:53	Benny Hill	Christmas no 1 1970. Inspired by Hill's early experience as a milkman for Hann's Dairies in Hampshire.
	My Brother	2:38	Terry Scott	1962, based on a schoolboy character (he dressed in the uniform to sing it on TV) and it received regular airplay on Ed Stewart's Junior Choice for many years.
	Joe 90	2:16	The Barry Gray Orchestra	1960s British science-fiction television series that follows the adventures of a nine-year-old boy, Joe McClaine.
	Thunderbirds	2:33	The Barry Gray Orchestra	Ran from 1964-66 - set between 2065-67. Opening sequence has countdown by actor Peter Dyneley (who voiced the character of Jeff): "5, 4, 3, 2, 1: Thunderbirds Are Go!"
	Hello Muddah Hello Fadduh	2:51	Allan Sherman	Won a 1964 Grammy Award for comedy - based on letters of complaint Allan received from his son Robert while he attended Camp Champlain in Westport, NY
	The Laughing Policeman	3:00	Charles Penrose	Recorded on 22 April 1926 by Charles Jolly, the pseudonym of Charles Penrose. It was a frequently requested recording on Junior Choice.
	Magpie	2:26	The Murgatroyd Band	Shown on ITV from 30 July 1968 to 6 June 1980. Was recorded in 1968 by Spencer Davis group under the alias of The Murgatroyd Band.
	Pop Goes the Weasel	2:45	Anthony Newley	1961, reached no 12. The rhyme has been played as a children's game since at least the late 19th century.
