	I'll Follow the Sun	1:55	The Beatles	Released in 1964 on the Beatles for Sale album
	Backslop	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
	Loaded	7:03	Primal Scream	The first single released from the group's 1991 breakthrough album, <i>Screamadelica</i> . At the start is an audio sample of Peter Fonda from the film <i>The Wild Angels</i> .
	Black Betty	0:57	Leadbelly	Traditional song that Leadbelly popularized before his death in 1949. Ram Jam Band had a hit with it in 1977.
	Hippy Hippy Shake	1:42	Chan Romero	Written and recorded by Chan Romero in 1959. UK-based The Swinging Blue Jeans had a top 5 hit with it in 1963.
	Think It Over	1:48	Buddy Holly	Written by Buddy Holly, Jerry Allison, and Norman Petty in 1958, reached number 11 in UK.
	How Soon Is Now?	6:46	The Smiths	Originally a B-side of the 1984 single "William, It Was Really Nothing". The subject is an individual who cannot find a way to overcome his crippling shyness and find a partner.
	Elizabeth My Dear	0:55	The Stone Roses	From their eponymous debut album, released in 1989 on Silvertone Records. The melody was appropriated from the English traditional ballad "Scarborough Fair"
	White Riot	1:59	The Clash	Released as the band's first single in March 1977 and also featured on their debut album, also eponymous.
	Annie	1:14	Elastica	Annabel "Annie" Holland was the bass guitarist for the Britpop band Elastica and had an this song named in her honour. 1995, another eponymous debut album.
	Station To Station	10:14	David Bowie	Title track from his 10th album, 1976. Every song on the album was released as a single. The album was the vehicle for his performance persona, the Thin White Duke. and recorded after he completed the film <i>The Man Who Fell to Earth</i> .
	Mega Armageddon Death	0:03	Electro Hippies	1989, from their debut album <i>The Only Good Punk...Is A Dead One</i>
	Banana Splits	1:54	The Dickies	Original was theme song for the children's television program <i>The Banana Splits Adventure Hour</i> , 1968. This version reached no. 7 in the UK Singles Chart in 1979.
	Stay	1:39	Maurice Williams And The Zodiacs	Written by Maurice Williams and first recorded in 1960 by Williams with his group the Zodiacs. Other successful versions by Hollies and the Four Seasons.
	White Punks On Dope	6:47	The Tubes	Based in San Francisco, from debut album <i>The Tubes</i> , 1975. Second single from that and peaked at no 28.
	You Suffer	0:02	Napalm Death	From their debut album, <i>Scum</i> . It is precisely 1.316 seconds long. Written by band members Nicholas Bullen, Justin Broadrick and Mick Harris.
	I'm in Love with a Girl	1:47	Big Star	1974, from their second album <i>Radio City</i>
	Mercedes Benz	1:45	Janis Joplin	1970. She got the idea for this song after riding in Bobby Womack's new Mercedes 600. In the '90s, Mercedes used this in commercials for their cars - perhaps one of the great misappropriations of a song in a commercial
	Garden Party	7:20	Marillion	"Garden Party (The Great Cucumber Massacre)" was the second single released from their debut album <i>Script for a Jester's Tear</i> , 1983. The song is a parody of social elitism and snobbery.
	Propaganda	0:22	Sparks	Title track from their fourth album <i>Propaganda</i> , 1974, which followed <i>Kimono My House</i> .
	Party	1:30	Elvis Presley	Recorded by for the 1957 movie <i>Loving You</i> , his first film in a starring role.
	Hot Dog	1:16	Elvis Presley	
	Love Hangover	6:12	The Associates	Originally from 1976, the fourth number one single for Diana Ross. This appeared on the US version of their third album <i>Sulk</i> , 1982.
	Mystery Dance	1:38	Elvis Costello	Declan Patrick MacManus. 1977, from debut album <i>My Aim Is True</i> , cost £2000 to record and was the first of five consecutive Costello albums produced by Nick Lowe
	Pale Green Ghosts	6:04	John Grant	Formerly associated with the Denver-based alternative rock band <i>The Czars</i> in the 1990s and early 2000s, he launched a career as a solo artist in 2010. From his second solo album, <i>Pale Green Ghosts</i> in 2013, recorded in Reykjavik, Iceland.
	She Said Yeah	1:37	The Rolling Stones	1965, from their third album <i>Out of Our Heads</i> . Written by Sonny Bono.
	Twenty Flight Rock	1:44	Eddie Cochran	Originally performed in the 1956 film comedy <i>The Girl Can't Help It</i>
	Nervous Wreck	1:59	The Radio Stars	Features on their 1978 debut album, <i>Songs for Swinging Lovers</i> , and was their only top hit. Uses the word <i>Electroencephalograph</i> in the chorus
	The Robots	6:13	Kraftwerk	Released as a single in 1978, from their seventh album, <i>The Man-Machine</i> .
	Do You Wanna Dance?	1:56	Ramones	Original by Bobby Freeman in 1958. This from Ramones third album <i>Rocket to Russia</i> , 1977.
	Rock 'n' Roll/Night Clubbing	6:20	Human League	From <i>Travelogue</i> , 1980.
