	Workin' Day And Night	5:14	Michael Jackson	Written and composed by Michael Jackson. Third track from his fifth studio album, <i>Off the Wall</i> , 1979. Not released as a single, but as the B-side for "Rock with You" in the USA, and B-side for "Off the Wall" in the UK
	Backslop	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
	The Honeydripper	3:00	Roosevelt Sykes	1906-1983, known as "The Honeydripper". He was a successful and prolific cigar-chomping blues piano player, whose rollicking thundering boogie-woogie was highly influential. First recorded by Joe Liggins in 1945.
	The Madison Time, Pt 1	3:08	Ray Bryant Combo	Released in 1960, featured in the 1988 movie <i>Hairspray</i> .
	Old Man Willis	3:16	Tony Joe White	1969, from his second album, <i>Continued</i> . Recorded at Monument Studios, Nashville
	Wild One	4:19	Thin Lizzy	1975, from fifth album, <i>Fighting</i> . The band finally forged an identifiable sound featuring the twin guitars of Scott Gorham and Brian Robertson.
	The Big Ones Get Away	3:48	Buffy Sainte-Marie	1992, from <i>Coincidence and Likely Stories</i> album, her only album to chart in the UK. This single reached 39 in UK.
	Too Much Monkey Business	2:29	Elvis Presley	Written and originally performed by Chuck Berry in 1958. This version features on 'Elvis Singing Flaming Star and Others', his 33rd album, 1968. Jerry Reed played lead guitar. Also recored by The Beatles at the BBC in 1963.
	Travelling Light (with Carla Torgerson)	4:42	Tindersticks	Formed in Nottingham in 1991, fronted by Stuart A. Staples. 1995, from their eponymous second album (first was as well)
	Do Anything You Want To Do	4:02	Eddie And The Hot Rods	A pub rock band from Essex founded in 1975, this from 1977. They split up in 1981, but have reformed several times since, with singer Barrie Masters the only constant member.
	China Grove	3:16	The Doobie Brothers	From The Doobie Brothers' 1973 album <i>The Captain and Me</i> . It was written and sung by original main singer/songwriter Tom Johnston.
	Der Mussolini	3:55	D.A.F	Deutsch Amerikanische Freundschaft, an influential German electropunk band from Düsseldorf, formed in 1978. The lyrics "Dance the Mussolini, move your behind, clap your hands, and now the Adolf Hitler, and now the Jesus Christ", caused a scandal.
	Trutti Frutti	6:23	New Order	From 'Music Complete' released in 2015 by Mute Records, their first album on the label and also first album without former bassist Peter Hook. Features Elly Jackson, otherwise known as La Roux.
	Sweet	4:53	World Of Twist	Formed in Sheffield in 1985. From their first and only album, <i>Quality Street</i> , 1991. The album is something of a lost classic of the pre-Brit-pop era.
	Highway Star	6:07	Deep Purple	Opening track on their 1972 album <i>Machine Head</i> . Organist Jon Lord claimed that the organ and guitar solos were based on Bach-like chord sequences.
	La Bière	3:25	Jacques Brel	A Belgian singer, songwriter and actor, he was a big influence on the likes of David Bowie, Alex Harvey, Leonard Cohen and Marc Almond. Lyrics go: It smells of beer from London to Berlin. It smells of beer, God we feel good.
	NY Excuse	4:48	Soulwax	Vomposed of David and Stephen Dewaele and Stefaan Van Leuven, are an alternative rock/electronic band from Ghent, Belgium. From 2005 album, <i>Any Minute Now</i> .
	Watcha See Is Watcha Get	3:36	Dramatics	Whatcha See Is Whatcha Get, debut studio album, released in 1971 on Volt Records
	Paper Planes	3:24	M.I.A.	British rapper M.I.A. from her second studio album, <i>Kala</i> (2007), her first Top 20 single in the UK. The song's backing track is a sample of the 1982 song "Straight to Hell" by The Clash, and the members of The Clash are credited as co-writers of the song.
	Baby It's You	3:23	Smith	Music by Burt Bacharach, it was also recorded by the Shirelles and the Beatles. This was highest charting version, got to number 5 in US in 1969. Featuring Gayle McCormick on lead vocals, who died beginning of this month.
	I Gotta Find Me Somebody	2:22	The Vel-Vets	Trio from LA, this from 1974.
	In Zaire	3:20	Johnny Wakelin	Born 1939 in Brighton, Sussex. His first single was <i>Black Superman (Muhammad Ali)</i> (1975). This was a much bigger success - also about Muhammad Ali, 1976.
