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| | Everybody Is A Star | 3:03 | The Family Stone | Written by Sylvester Stewart. Released as the b-side to the band's 1970 single "Thank You (Falettinme Be Mice Elf Agin)", reached number one on the Billboard Hot 100 in February 1970. |
| | Backslop | 2:33 | Baby Earl & The Trinidads | |
| | Win Place Or Show (She's A Winner) | 2:29 | The Intruders | 1972. One of the first groups to have hit songs under the direction of Kenny Gamble and Leon Huff, they had a major influence on the development of Philadelphia soul. |
| | Silver Lady | 3:41 | David Soul | Number one in August 1977, toppling Elvis off the top slot |
| | Sister Golden Hair | 3:21 | America | From their fifth album Hearts (1975). Lyrics were largely inspired by the works of Jackson Browne. |
| | Maxwell's Silver Hammer | 3:28 | The Beatles | 1969, sung by Paul McCartney on their album Abbey Road - Lennon doesn't appear on it at all. About a person named Maxwell who commits murders with a hammer. |
| | Silver Machine | 4:40 | Hawkwind | Recorded live at a Greasy Truckers benefit gig at The Roundhouse in 1972, but lead vocals later recorded by Lemmy in a studio as original live vocals by Robert Calvert considered to be too weak. |
| | Going For Gold | 4:24 | Shed Seven | Their seventh single, entered the UK charts at number 8 in 1996, giving the band their biggest hit. |
| | Fools Gold | 4:16 | The Stone Roses | 1989, it became the band's biggest commercial hit at the time and was their first single to reach the top ten |
| | Glittering Prize | 4:02 | Simple Minds | Single from 1982, from their fifth studio album New Gold Dream. |
| | A Small Victory | 4:57 | Faith No More | 1992, from fourth studio album Angel Dust which also featured their version of Lionel Richie's Easy. |
| | Race For The Prize | 4:18 | The Flaming Lips | First single taken from their 1999 album The Soft Bulletin, and reaching #39 in the UK Singles Chart. |
| | Solid Gold Easy Action | 2:23 | Marc Bolan & T.Rex | 1972. First two lines of the song, "Life is the same and it always will be / Easy as picking foxes from a tree". The license plate of the car Bolan was in during the fatal collision with a tree was FOX 661L. |
| | Golden Retriever | 2:28 | Super Furry Animals | It was the first single to be issued from the album Phantom Power and reached number 13 on the UK Singles Chart on its release in 2003. About the relationship between [Gruff Rhys's] girlfriend's two dogs - a male and a female. |
| | Gold On The Ceiling | 3:44 | The Black Keys | 2012, the third track from their seventh studio album, El Camino. The band Sweet (with guitarist Andy Scott as the only original member) covered this song on their 2012 album New York Connection. |
| | Silver Star | 4:03 | Frankie Valli & The Four Seasons | This was their first single that did not feature the lead vocals of Frankie Valli, drummer Gerry Polci sang lead. 1976. |
| | Gold Digger | 3:28 | Kanye West feat. Jamie Foxx | Released as the second single from West's second album, Late Registration (2005). Features Jamie Foxx singing a sample of Ray Charles' I Got a Woman - in the previous year he played Charles in the biopic Ray. |
| | Black & Gold | 3:32 | Sam Sparro | 2008, from Australian recording artist Sam Sparro's eponymous debut album. |
| | Heart Of Gold | 3:10 | Neil Young | Released from the 1972 album Harvest, it Young's only U.S. No. 1 single. Features backup vocals from James Taylor and Linda Ronstadt. |
| | Goldfinger | 2:49 | Shirley Bassey | Title song from the 1964 James Bond film Goldfinger. Jimmy Page is said to have been a guitarist at the session. |
| | Silver Threads And Golden Needles | 2:14 | The Springfields | The Springfields were a folk trio of Dusty Springfield, her brother Tom, and their friend Tim Field. First recorded by Wanda Jackson in 1956, this from 1968 |
| | Silver Threads Amongst the Gold | 4:20 | The Fureys & Davey Arthur | First copyrighted in 1873, was a popular song in the United States in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. |
| | Champion the Wonder Horse | 2:17 | Frankie Laine | An American children's Western series that ran for 26 episodes in 1955/56. In real life, the Wonder Horse, Champion, was owned by Gene Autry, who gained fame as a singing cowboy on the radio, in movies, and on television. |
| | The Winner Takes it All | 4:56 | ABBA | Released as the first single from the group's Super Trouper album in 1980. |
