	English country garden	2:45	Jimmie Rodgers	Often known as Jimmie F. Rodgers to differentiate him and the "The Singing Brakeman". His biggest hit, reached Number 5 in the chart in June 1962.
	Backslop	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
	Diggin' My Potatoes	2:44	Washboard Sam	Robert Brown (1910 – 1966), known professionally as Washboard Sam. Reputedly the half-brother of Big Bill Broonzy.
	Nothin' Shakin' (But The Leaves On The Trees)	2:57	Eddie Fontaine	1958. Also covered by The Beatles, Dr. Feelgood, Billy Fury, and others.
	Down In A Willow Garden	2:33	Kosoy Sisters with Erik Darling	They are identical twin sisters (Irene Saletan and Ellen Christenson) who perform American folk and old time music. This from 1956, they still perform. Their version of "I'll Fly Away" was used in the 2000 film O Brother, Where Art Thou?
	Poison Ivy	2:45	The Lambrettas	This was their biggest hit, 1980, a cover version of the 1950s Leiber and Stoller song. The original singer, Jez Bird died of cancer in 2008, at the age of 50. The rest of the band reformed in 2009 and are touring the UK and Europe.
	Octopus's Garden	2:51	The Beatles	Written by Ringo Starr (under his real name Richard Starkey) from their 1969 album Abbey Road - only the second song he has ever written
	Where Have All The Flowers Gone	2:58	The Searchers	Written by Pete Seeger in 1955. From their debut album Meet The Searchers, released 1963. Covered by Peter, Paul and Mary, Bobby Darin and Roy Orbison, amongst others. Seeger wrote this song as a call for peace.
	Morning Dew	3:40	Tim Rose	1966. The song is a dialogue between the last man and woman left alive following an apocalyptic catastrophe.
	Sally Go Round The Roses	3:00	The Jaynetts	1963 hit, a Bronx-based one-hit wonder girl group. Inspired from the nursery rhyme "Ring Around the Rosie"
	Garden Party	3:46	Rick Nelson	Tells the story of Nelson being booed off the stage at Madison Square Garden because he had long hair and contemporary clothes - unlike when he was a teen idol
	Green Green Grass Of Home	2:41	John Otway	Having been dropped by Polydor, Otway went to Stiff Records. His first release with them came in October 1980 and was this cover of the Tom Jones hit.
	Ramblin Rose	2:07	Ronnie Ronalde	Born Ronald Charles Waldron, 1923, London, Still active. His best known recording is "In a Monastery Garden"
	Sat In Your Lap	3:30	Kate Bush	It was the first single to be released from her fourth album The Dreaming (1982). Song deals with 'humanity's endless search for knowledge, which is often limited by unwillingness to devote the effort necessary to attain it'
	A Good Year For The Roses	3:09	Elvis Costello	Originally recorded by George Jones in 1970. This from his 1981 country album, Almost Blue
	Can You Dig It?	4:11	The Mock Turtles	1991. Manchester based indie rock band led by Martin Coogan, older brother of actor/comedian Steve Coogan.
	New Rose	2:42	The Damned	Released October 1976. It was the first single by a British punk group. The B-side was a cover of The Beatles' "Help!"
	Ace Of Spades	2:47	Motörhead	1980, The song opens with an overdriven bass solo played by Lemmy. Lyrics used "used gambling metaphors, mostly cards and dice". The song is considered to be the definitive Motörhead anthem.
	Hong Kong Garden	2:55	Siouxsie & The Banshees	Produced by Steve Lillywhite. On Polydor Records and reached no 7 in 1978. The song was named after the Hong Kong Garden Chinese takeaway in Chislehurst High Street.
	Where The Wild Roses Grow	3:57	Nick Cave & The Bad Seeds	1995 duet with Kylie Minogue. Cave was inspired to write this after listening to the traditional song, "Down in the Willow Garden" - a tale of a man courting a woman and killing her while they are out together.
	Pushin' Too Hard	2:37	The Seeds	1968. Said to be one of "The 500 Songs that Shaped Rock and Roll" Vocalist Sky Saxon wrote it in 15 minutes while sitting in a car waiting for his girlfriend to finish shopping at a supermarket.
	The Life Of Riley	4:04	The Lightning Seeds	
	Green Onions	2:52	Byron Lee & The Dragonaires	Original 1962.
	Love Grows (Where My Rosemary Goes)	2:50	Edison Lighthouse	One-hit wonder from 1970. Lead vocals were by Tony Burrows - who also sang vocals for The Flowerpot Men
	I'll Pick A Rose For My Rose	2:37	Marv Johnson	1969. Most notable for performing on the first record to be issued from what became Motown - Come to Me in 1959.
	He Who Picks A Rose	2:42	Jimmy Ruffin	Elder brother of David Ruffin of The Temptations, passed away on 17 November.
	I Wanna Get Next To You	3:58	Rose Royce	1976, written, composed and produced by American songwriter and producer Norman Whitfield. It is the third single from the Car Wash soundtrack
	Cherry Pink and Apple Blossom White	2:26	Pérez Prado	The most popular version of the song, reaching number one in 1955
