	Here Comes Summer	2:10	Jerry Keller	1959, written and performed by Keller, No. 1 for one week in the UK Singles Chart and was his only hit.
	Backslop	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
	The Music's Hot	2:36	Slim Harpo	James Isaac Moore (1924 -1970), an American blues musician, a leading exponent of the swamp blues style, and "one of the most commercially successful blues artists of his day".
	You Are My Sunshine	3:01	Ray Charles	First recorded by Jimmie Davis in 1939. This from his classic 1962 album Modern Sounds in Country and Western Music Volume Two.
	Ain't No Sunshine	2:06	Bill Withers	From his 1971 album Just As I Am, produced by Booker T. Jones. The record featured musicians Donald "Duck" Dunn on bass guitar, Al Jackson, Jr. on drums and Stephen Stills on guitar.
	Summer Fun	3:13	Barracudas	English-Canadian band that formed in the late 1970s. Reached number 37 in the UK Singles Chart in 1980.
	Long Hot Summer	3:49	The Style Council	Recorded June 1983. By coincidence, July of that year turned out to be one of the hottest on record – something that would not have been known at the time the song was written and recorded.
	You Stole The Sun From My Heart	4:23	Manic Street Preachers	1999, released as the third single from the album This Is My Truth Tell Me Yours. Nicky Wire has described the music as a mix of New Order and Nirvana.
	Red Sun	3:15	Lindsey Buckingham & Christine McVie	From their new album, released this month. Four of the five members of Fleetwood Mac are featured in the album, with contributions from drummer Mick Fleetwood and bassist John McVie. Vocalist Stevie Nicks is the sole member absent.
	She's Hot To Go	2:36	Lyle Lovett	From his second studio album, Pontiac, released in 1987.
	Summer Breeze	3:07	The Isley Brothers	Written and recorded by Seals and Crofts in 1972. The Isley Brothers covered in a harder rock-soulful style in 1974.
	Summertime	2:42	Billy Stewart	An aria composed by George Gershwin for the 1935 opera Porgy and Bess. This is most commercially successful version, reached no 10 in US in 1966.
	The Sun Ain't Gonna Shine Anymore	3:04	The Walker Brothers	Frankie Valli recorded and released the first version of the song but his single achieved little success. This version was a UK number 1 in 1966.
	Summer in the City	2:43	The Lovin' Spoonful	1966. The song features a series of car horns during the instrumental bridge, starting with a Volkswagen Beetle horn.
	Too Hot	3:11	The Specials	Song was a Prince Buster original from 1966. From self titled debut album, 1979. Produced by Elvis Costello.
	Always the Sun	4:07	The Stranglers	1986, the second single from the album Dreamtime. Despite radio play and much hype, it only reached number 30 in the UK Singles Chart.
	Staying Out For The Summer	3:14	Dodgy	From Homegrown, their second album, released in 1994.
	Blister in the Sun	2:25	Violent Femmes	1983. The Milwaukee band were probably singing about heroin addiction, featured on the soundtrack to Grosse Pointe Blank featuring John Cusack.
	Automatically Sunshine	2:37	The Supremes	1972, written by Smokey Robinson. Lead vocals by Mary Wilson and Jean Terrell.
	Sunshine Of Your Love	3:41	Spanky Wilson	Original on Disraeli Gears by Cream, 1967. This version from 1968
	California Sun	2:08	Ramones	Originally by Joe Jones in 1961, most well known version by Rivieras in 1964. This from 1977 Leave Home album
	Summer wine	4:17	Nancy Sinatra & Lee Hazlewood	Written by Lee Hazlewood, 1966. It describes a man, voiced by Hazlewood, who meets a woman, Sinatra, who notices his silver spurs and invites him to have wine with her.
	Summer Night City	3:37	ABBA	1978, written by Benny Andersson and Björn Ulvaeus as a tribute to their hometown of Stockholm. It is the group's second non-album single - the first being Fernando
	Hot Pants	3:11	James Brown	From his 1971 album, Hot Pants, his 37th
	Summer (The First Time)	4:40	Bobby Goldsboro	1973, the story of a 17-year-old who catches the eye of a 31-year old woman, chillin in her gown on front her porch with a mint julep and he sees 'the sun rise as a man.'
	The summerhouse	4:14	The Divine Comedy	1994, from Promenade, their third album - a concept album about two lovers who spend a day at the seaside.
	Cruel Summer	3:31	Bananarama	A top-ten hit on the UK Singles Chart in 1983
	Walking On Sunshine	4:45	Rockers Revenge featuring Donnie Calvin	A studio musical project, assembled by producer Arthur Baker in 1982. Aside from Arthur Baker, it consisted of members Donnie Calvin, Dwight Hawkes and Tina B - most remembered for this 1982 hit
	Bring Me Sunshine	1:51	Morcambe & Wise	Written in 1966 by the composer Arthur Kent, with lyrics by Sylvia Dee. The song is synonymous with the popular comedy duo Morecambe & Wise, after it was adopted as their signature tune in their second series for the BBC in 1969.
