Framed	2:47	The Coasters	Composed by Jerry Leiber / Mike Stoller. 1954, B-side of Loop De Loop Mambo
Rock and Roll	3:41	Led Zeppelin	From 'IV', 1971, with a guest appearance by The Rolling Stones pianist Ian Stewart.
Can Blue Men Sing The Whites?	2:50	Bonzo Dog Doo-Dah Band	From The Bonzos 1968 album "The Doughnut in Granny's Greenhouse" (obscure slang for the lavatory). A parody of British Blues, written by Vivian Stanshall
Worried About My Woman	3:07	Chicken Shack	1968. features Christine Perfect on keyboards. Big hit with I'd Rather Go Blind in this year. She left the band shortly after this to marry John McVie of Fleetwood Mac.
Buona Sera	3:38	Acker Bilk	Cover of Louis Prima's from 1960. Passed away aged 85 this week.
I Feel Free	2:57	Cream	The first single recorded by Cream. Lyrics were written by Pete Brown and music by Jack Bruce. From US version of their debut album, Fresh Cream (1966) - not on UK album. Produced by Robert Stigwood. Died aged 71.
Sunshine Of Your Love	3:41	Spanky Wilson	Original on Disraeli Gears by Cream, 1967. This version from 1968
Generals And Majors	3:42	XTC	1980, from forth album 'Black Sea'.
Pride and Joy	3:41	Stevie Ray Vaughan & Double Trouble	1983, from Texas Flood, his first studio album
Truckin'	3:19	Grateful Dead	From 1970 album American Beauty. It was recognized by the United States Library of Congress in 1997 as a national treasure. Uses the band's misfortunes on the road as a metaphor for getting through the constant changes in life
Who Are You	5:06	The Who	From 1978 album, Who Are You, the last before drummer Keith Moon's death in September in the same year.
Imitation	4:14	Kid Creole & The Coconuts	Founder August Darnell born in The Bronx, New York 1950. From 1982 album Tropical Gangsters
Goodbye to Love	3:56	The Carpenters	1972. One of the first love ballads, if not the first, to have a fuzz guitar solo (Tony Peluso). Richard has stated the guitar solo is one of the best in recorded history.
The Last Will And Testament Of Jake Thackray	3:01	Jake Thackray	Born in Leeds, known as the North Country Noël Coward. From first album, 1967
U Don't Dance 2 Tekno Anymore	3:38	Alabama 3	From debut album Exile on Coldharbour Lane, 1983. Also contains Sopranos opening theme - Woke Up This Morning
Do Your Dance	3:29	Rose Royce	Minor hit in 1977
(Are You Ready) Do The Bus Stop	3:35	The Fatback Band	1975, is said to have contributed to the development of line dancing. Had a hit with Double Dutch in 1977.
Soul Time	2:39	Shirley Ellis	She is best known for her novelty hits The Nitty Gritty (1963) and The Clapping Song (1965). This soul stomper from 1967.

I'm On My Way	3:26	Barbara Dane	She appeared with Louis Armstrong on the Timex All-Star Jazz Show hosted by Jackie Gleason on January 7, 1959
