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| I Saw Her Standing There | 2:58 | The Beatles | Opening track on the Beatles' debut album, Please Please Me, released on 22 March 1963. |
| Backslap | 2:33 | Baby Earl & The Trinidads | |
| Blue Moon of Kentucky | 2:08 | Bill Monroe | Bill Monroe wrote the song in 1946, recorded with his band Bluegrass Boys which Lester Flatt and banjoist Earl Scruggs, who would later form their own bluegrass band, the Foggy Mountain Boys. Elvis' version was his first Sun single, 1954. |
| Tricky Dicky | 2:10 | Richie Barrett | Written by Leiber, Stoller and Barrett in 1962. On Atlantic label. Most well known for 'Some Other Guy'. Covered by Beatles and The Searchers |
| Oke She Moke She Pop | 2:47 | Big Joe Turner | This 1953 collaboration between blues shouter Big Joe Turner and slide guitarist Elmore James marked the only time they ever recorded a single together. |
| House Cleaning | 2:18 | The Spaniels | Led by Pookie Hudson and considered to be the first true leader of a vocal group, because the they pioneered the technique of having the main singer solo at his own microphone, while the rest of the group shared a second microphone |
| The Work Song | 2:20 | Deltas | 1962 |
| Drinking Wine Spo-Dee-O-Dee | 2:33 | Larry Dale | 1962 on Atlantic. Was a particularly raucous song when Sticks McGhee recorded it in 1949. It's about getting drunk and not caring who knows it. |
| Beer Drinking Baby | 2:38 | Billie Valentine | 1950. Billie Valentine on vocals and piano, John Coltrane on tenor sax and Ray Brown on bass. |
| Mona | 2:22 | Bo Diddley | 1957, "Hey! Bo Diddley" is Bo Diddley's eighth Checker Records single - this was the B side (sometimes known as "I Need You Baby"). |
| Saturday Night Fish Fry | 2:17 | The Blue Dots | |
| Morning Glory | 2:34 | James & Bobby Purify | Their biggest hits were "I'm Your Puppet" in 1966, this from 10 years later - but with a different Bobby. Actually was Ben Moore, who had worked with Otis Redding and James Brown |
| Sing A Little Song | 3:06 | Desmond Dekker | 1975, it deals with life's hardships in a light-hearted manner |
| Work All Day | 3:26 | Barry Biggs | Best known in the UK for his cover of the Blue Magic song, "Sideshow", which got to number 3 in the UK Singles Chart in 1977. This was from 1976 and was his first chart single. |
| Frankenstein Ska | 2:39 | Byron Lee & The Dragonaires | |
| Sneakin' Sally Thru' the Alley | 4:25 | Robert Palmer | From debut solo album of the same name, released in 1974. Written by Allen Toussaint. Palmer is backed by The Meters and Lowell George of Little Feat. |
| Mexican Radio | 3:57 | Wall Of Voodoo | 1983 single. Lead singer and player of organ, synthesizer and harmonica was Stan Ridgway. had a hit with 'Camouflage' in 1986. |
| Driver's Seat | 4:00 | Sniff 'N' The Tears | Their one-hit wonder from 1979. According to singer Paul Roberts, it isn't about driving, but rather "fragmented, conflicting thoughts and emotions that might follow the break-up of a relationship" |
| A Song From Under The Floorboards | 4:12 | Magazine | From 'The Correct Use of Soap', their third album, released by Virgin Records in 1980. |
| Blister In The Sun | 2:26 | Violent Femmes | 1983. |
| Sunday Morning Coming Down | 4:08 | Johnny Cash | Written by Kris Kristofferson and first recorded by Ray Stevens in 1969. Cash's recording won the Country Music Association Award for Song of the Year in 1970 . |
| Wine, Women And Song | 2:04 | Loretta Lynn | The coal miner's daughter, raised in Butcher Hollow, Kentucky. 1976. |
| Truck Drivin' Son Of A Gun | 2:10 | Dave Dudley | Born Gerard Antony Mooney, best known for his truck-driving country anthems of the 1960s and 1970s and his semi-slurred baritone. 1965. |
| A Little Piece Of Leather | 2:41 | Donnie Elbert | A performance highlighting his powerful falsetto voice, hit in 1972 |
| The Way You Do The Things You Do | 2:37 | The Temptations | 1964. Lead vocals by Eddie Kendricks. Background vocals by Melvin Franklin, Paul Williams, David Ruffin, and Otis Williams. Instrumentation by The Funk Brothers |
| Morning Dance | 3:58 | Spyro Gyra | Morning Dance is Spyro Gyra's most commercially successful album, released in summer 1979. |
