	Ain't Nobody Here But Us Chickens	3:08	Louis Jordan and His Tympany Five	1946 song, number one on the US Billboard Rhythm and blues
	Backslap	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
	The Greasy Chicken	3:10	Andre Williams	Zephire Andre Williams, born 1936. Still active. Co-wrote Shake a Tail Feather and also some songs for Parliament and Funkadelic. This from 1957.
	East L.A.	2:37	Solid Jackson	1960.
	Somewhere Down The Line	2:13	Little Johnny Taylor	Most famous for, "Part Time Love" (1963), also covered by Johnnie Taylor. Started off singing Gospel, but influenced by Little Willie John, and became an R&B artist
	Cheaper To Keep Her	3:20	Johnnie Taylor	1973. Recorded on the Stax label 60s and early 70s. Biggest hit with "Who's Making Love"
	Good Rockin' Daddy	2:29	Etta James	1955, her 2nd top 10 hit. First was "The Wallflower (Dance with Me, Henry)"
	Chairman Of The Board	3:35	The Chairmen Of The Board	Singer General Johnson (1943 - 2010). Single in 1971, but only reached 48 in UK.
	She's So Good To Me	2:19	Wilson Pickett	From his second album, The Exciting Wilson Pickett, 1966. Also contained In The Midnight Hour and Land Of 1000 Dances. This written by Bobby Womack.
	That's All Right	1:55	Elvis Presley	Recorded July 5th 1954 at Sun Studios, 706 Union Avenue, Memphis, Tennessee.
	Little Sister	3:49	Ry Cooder	From Bop till You Drop, his eighth album, and released in 1979. Originally by Elvis in 1961, written by Doc Pomus and Mort Shuman
	Fire and Brimstone	4:21	Link Wray	From 1971 self-titled album. Later covered by The Neville Brothers on their album Yellow Moon. Most known for 1958 instrumental hit Rumble.
	American Girl	3:31	Tom Petty and The Heartbreakers	1977, second single from Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers' self-titled debut album.
	America	3:36	Simon & Garfunkel	From their fourth studio album, Bookends (1968). Includes reference to Kathy Chitty, Simon's former girlfriend.
	Both Ends Burning (7" Mix)	4:01	Roxy Music	From 1975 album Siren, the cover features bandmember Bryan Ferry's then-girlfriend, model Jerry Hall, on rocks near Anglesey.
	Move Me	3:24	The Woodentops	1985 on Rough Trade
	Main title from 'The man with the golden arm'	2:51	Billy May Orchestra	Theme from 1955 film of same name, the story of a heroin addict who gets clean while in prison, but struggles to stay that way in the outside world. Stars Frank Sinatra. Film opens with a title sequence by Saul Bass.
	Peter Gunn	3:00	Quincy Jones	Peter Gunn is an American private eye television series which aired on the NBC and later ABC television networks from 1958 to 1961, created by Blake Edwards.
	This Note's For You	2:06	Neil Young	From This Note's for You, his seventeenth studio album, released in 1988. About the commercialism of rock and roll, corporate rock, the pretensions of advertising.
	Looking for a Love	2:33	Bobby Womack	Initially by The Valentinos in 1961, which featured the Womack brothers including Bobby and Cecil. He re-recorded it in 1973, again with his brothers on backing vocals.
	Me, Myself & I	3:41	De La Soul	1989. It established the group's characteristic style of combining hip hop with humor and social commentary.
	Heaven Is In The Back Seat Of My Cadillac	3:55	Hot Chocolate	Reached no. 25 in 1976 - had at least one hit every year between 1970 and 1984. Did a version of John Lennon's "Give Peace a Chance" in 1969 and subsequently signed to Apple Records.
	If It's All The Same To You Babe	2:52	Luther Ingram	Recorded in Detroit with The Funk Brothers moonlighting from Motown. Best known for the 1972 hit, "(If Loving You Is Wrong) I Don't Want to Be Right
	Zorba's Dance	2:53	Marcello Minerbi	1964 film Zorba the Greek, a song by Greek composer Mikis Theodorakis
